Spotlight on Learning: Debate: BC is Not a Racist Province

Presented by: Mr. Matt Born Course: Social Justice 12

Driving Question: What factors led to changes or continuities affecting groups of people differently? Compare how different groups benefitted or suffered because of a particular change?

Teacher Description and / or Reflection: Reflecting on the unit and the culminating debate on, "BC is not a racist province," the topic is both complex and sensitive. As an educator, I am continually reminded that such discussions require a skillfully navigated balance of providing opportunities for inquiry, fostering open dialogue, and ensuring a respectful environment where all students have a voice.

The debate brought to light various perspectives, highlighting the importance of understanding racism not simply as individual acts of prejudice, but as systemic issues that affect communities.





Students showcased their knowledge and were engaged in critical thinking about societal

issues, reflecting on historical and contemporary contexts of racism in British Columbia.

Overall, the debate served as a valuable learning experience, not only for the students but also for me, in understanding the dynamics of classroom discussions on sensitive topics. This has

been a great opportunity to reflect on my teaching practices and the impact of these conversations on student perspectives and community awareness.

Rules for Parking Lot in Front of the School

Just a reminder about some rules for the parking lot in front of the school in the mornings and afterschool. There are in fact 2 lanes that enter our school by Trethewey Street. A left lane into staff & guest parking and a right lane into drive through in front of the school. It is never a good idea to switch lanes when pulling into the front of the school as another car is turning as well. We have had several near accidents and people getting upset at each other due to this. Please also note that when exiting the front parking lot that there are also 2 lanes. Please turn left if you are in the inside lane and turn right if you are on the outside lane. Again, please do not switch lanes when exiting.

Also be careful when turning left off Mouat Drive onto Trethewey Street. We have at least one accident every month as cars in the inside lane do not see the car turning left. We encourage you to turn right and take the longer way around in the morning and afters school as it is safer. Thank-you in advance for following these rules for the front parking lot.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation is observed on September 30th each year. The day honors the lost children and Survivors of Canada's residential schools, their families, and communities. It is a direct response to Calls to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada (TRC), which examined the legacy of the Indian Residential School system that operated for over a century in Canada.

Residential schools, funded by the government and run mostly by churches, forcibly removed Indigenous children from their families and communities. These schools aimed to assimilate Indigenous children into Euro-Canadian culture, often through abusive and dehumanizing methods. Many children suffered physical, emotional, and sexual abuse, and thousands are believed to have died as a result of mistreatment, neglect, or disease. The establishment of Truth and Reconciliation Day is part of Canada's effort to acknowledge the lasting trauma caused by these schools and work towards healing. It is a day for all Canadians to reflect on this dark chapter of history, learn about the ongoing impacts of colonialism, and commit to meaningful action toward reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples.

Orange Shirt Day

September 30th is also Orange Shirt Day, which originated in 2013 as a grassroots movement. The day was inspired by the story of Phyllis Webstad, a residential school Survivor who, as a child, had her new orange shirt taken away on her first day at a residential school. The orange shirt has since become a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom, and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

This day is an opportunity for education, reflection, and building stronger relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people in the spirit of reconciliation. Many people wear orange to show solidarity and remember the children who were affected by these schools.

We celebrated Orange Shirt Day at WJ Mouat on Thursday, September 26th as Friday was a pro-d day and Monday is a holiday. Miigwech.
